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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Karmashree Hiteswar Saikia College is one of the premier colleges located at Panjabari Road, Sixmile, Guwahati, Kamrup Metro district of Assam. The college was established in the year 1988 with its motto "*To strive, to seek, to find and not to yield*". With the shifting of the capital of Assam from Shillong to Dispur, the city of Guwahati witnessed tremendous growth of population and expansion. But the facilities for higher education still remained virtually limited as the existing colleges in the city failed to cater the need to accommodate a proportionately large number of students and as a result, many students found their doors closed to their aspirations of getting higher education.

The realization of this fact and the deep understanding of the situation convinced some prominent educationists and politicians about the prospects of founding a college in the Eastern Part of Guwahati City in 1988. The college was named as City College initially but later it is renamed as Karmashree Hiteswar Saikia College, in the fond memory of the founder patron of the college and former Chief Minister of Assam Late Karmashree Hiteswar Saikia, in a public meeting held on 4th Jan., 2004.

Since its inception, the college has been dedicatedly rendering service in imparting higher education at UG level. Due to the active involvement in disseminating knowledge Gauhati University extended permanent affiliation in the year 2010 for the ongoing Arts course. The college obtained recognition under Section 2(f) & 12(B) of the UGC Act, 1956 in 22nd February, 2013. The Arts Stream of the college was provincialized in 3rd June, 2014 under the Provincialization Act by Govt. of Assam (w.e.f. 14th August, 2013). The Commerce Stream of the college is run by the management in a self-financed mode, which was started from August, 2013, after a huge demand from the public to open Commerce Stream. The college is thus a fast growing Coeducational institution with Arts and Commerce Streams, located at an ideal place near Sixmile on the Panjabari Road, Guwahati-22. The atmosphere here is quiet, presenting a serene educational environment.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to Gauhati University and hence the college follows the curriculum designed and developed by the affiliating University. The college imparts teaching to students as per the curriculum designed by the affiliating university, which is based on UGC guidelines. The Academic Calendar of the college is prepared in conformity to the general Academic Calendar provided by the affiliating university with some modifications to suit our courses and condition for effective transaction of curriculum. The departments prepare departmental class routine and department course plan. The college adopts many strategies for effective implementation of the curriculum through which the objectives of the college are achieved. The academic calendar and class routine are prepared at the beginning of each academic year. The college takes regular feedback from its stakeholders for the better implementation of the curriculum. The HODs monitor the implementation of the curriculum and the academic plan, and then it is reported from time to the Principal. The curriculum is delivered by using effective teaching strategies. Seminars, Workshops, and programs are organized by respective departments to fulfill the mission, vision, and objectives of the college. The college offers 10 subjects in the BA Programme. The college also accommodates Distance Education Centre under IDOL, Gauhati University and Krishna Kanta Handiqui State Open University to provide UG and PG courses. In the regular curriculum, skill-based courses like computer skills and communication skills as well as the interdisciplinary courses of Environmental Studies and separate multidisciplinary courses have been incorporated as compulsory core courses. Further, the college offers remedial classes to weak students and the educational field trip is organized by each department to develop the skills and understanding different aspects of respective subjects. The college is also looking forward in introducing more courses in the years to come.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college pays serious attention to improve the quality of the teaching-learning process. Advertisement for

Admission is made in the local newspapers and college website declaring the date of issue of Admission Form, last date of submission and date of admission. It is a co-education institution and equity is fairly maintained in admission irrespective of caste, creed, sex and religion. Provisions are also made for differently able student to have easy access to class rooms.

The faculty member of the college regularly takes their classes as per the schedule of the class routine prepared by the Routine committee of the institution . Along with the regular classes, they too take remedial classes as per the need of students. Various teaching methods, like class interaction, discussion, department seminar and home assignment as a process of self learning etc. are adopted to substantiate lecture method. In terms of evaluation of the performance of students, the college has adopted many evaluation methods like internal exams, assignments, and viva, etc. as per the guidelines of the affiliating university. Teaching-learning is made more effective by the use of ICT like Interactive Board and LCD Projector etc. These apart, a few departments conduct field study to fulfil the requirement of courses.

The faculty strength of this college is 42 (19 Permanent and 23 Temporary). The college encourages the faculty to participate in various faculty development programmes. All the teachers have participated in national/ International seminars/Conferences and a good number of teachers have participated in different UGC sponsored orientation programmes and Refresher Courses in various HRDCs of the Country.

Semester assessment is made on the basis of sessional examinations, home assignment, department seminar / group discussion and class attendance. The departments also conduct class test from time to time. The End semester examination is conducted in the college as examination centre as the affiliating university.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Karmashree Hiteswar Saikia College always encourages its faculty members to undertake research activities wherever possible in spite of the limited opportunity in the college. The search for truth and rational thinking can be achieved through sincere research. A good research can leave an impact on society. The institution offers under graduate courses. Therefore, the research is limited. However, the college encourages its teachers to undertake research projects, both minor and major, to enhance the quality of education. Some of our teachers have undergone research works for M.Phil, Ph.D and UGC sponsored minor research projects , while many are aspiring to go for higher educational degrees. In order to encourage and familiarize research to both students and teachers, the institution organizes inter-departmental seminars, workshops, symposium etc. Keeping in mind the importance of research, some of our teachers have been publishing research articles in various journals/Books. The college also organizes both state and national seminars to encourage research.

Innovations and extension activities are conducted in the areas where the college is doing very well. As such, the college has an active NSS, Scouts and Guides and various Cells and Committees. The students and teachers of the college understands the importance of community service and participates in activities that helps society. Every year these committees and cells undertake different extension and outreach progammes such as cleanliness, plantation and other public awareness drives.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has been making full efforts for the development of infrastructure of the college. There are adequate class rooms, separate spacious and a well accommodated Auditorium along with modern amenities well furnished centrally A/c with a seating capacity of 450 seats, separate offices for Distance Education

Centres & IQAC, well furnished Computer Education Centre, separate department rooms for each department, Laboratories for the Department of Education, Geography and Psychology, Canteens, Guest Houses with necessary accommodations, Pure drinking running water facility, High power generator and a 250 KVA Electricity transformer for the college. Besides, the college has a fully equipped centally A/C auditorium and a resourceful library. The library has a spacious reading room with a seat capacity of fifty students. The students are facilitated with Boys Common Room, Girls Common Room, College Union Body Room, separate toilets for boys and girls, recreation area (shed), 2 small playgrounds, one Open Stage, both Bike and Car parkings. Separate arrangement is also made for teacher to carry out research activity in the library. The college has provided ICT facility in the form of digital classroom and wifi facility in the computer centre. There is a Campus Development Committee to look after the whole affairs of the campus including beautification, sanitation and cleanliness. Though we have the Wi-Fi facility only at our library and departmental common rooms but the college is planning to introduce campus WI-FI and necessary arrangement is already made to do so..

Student Support and Progression

The college is committed towards students' progression and extends all support for their development. The college has varied units for students like NSS, Scouts and Guides etc. The college provides remedial classes for the weaker students in order to bring improvement in their academic performance. The multiple cells, add on skills and career guidance are some of the initiatives taken up by the institution to benefit its students to become contributive members of society. Guardian meetings are held regularly to promote understanding and cordial relation between the college and the parents to ensure support to the students, both at home and in college. The academic calendar that has been carefully designed is an indicative of maintaining equilibrium between academia and extra-curricular activities. Besides the college also assist students in availing scholarship schemes from the governments. Provisions have been made to solve problems and prospects of all section of student through Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Ragging Committee and Women Cell etc. The active participation of Alumni Association in the college is also an indication of a strong bond between the alumni and the college.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college has its own vision, mission and objectives. A transparent and democratic decision making process is maintained. The Governing Body is the authority for internal management and decision making. The management of Karmashree Hiteswar Saikia College is highly decentralized and democratic in its approach. It has a well-defined quality policy and action plan. The Principal of the college plays an important role in designing and implementation of plan and policies of the college. She sets internal policies and programs of the college with the association of IQAC Coordinator, Heads of various departments, conveners of different committees, librarians, and senior members of non-teaching staff. Different committees have been constituted to conduct different activities with a view to make effective implementation. The IQAC of the college functions as a key commander in monitoring various activities and coordinating the diverse stakeholders. The college has a Master Plan that provides direction for future infrastructures and academic development. Student feedback on teachers is maintained to ensure teacher accountability towards students and Grievance Redrassal Cell has been formed to pay heed to the opinions/suggestions and meet up the grievances of its stakeholders. The budget allocation to the college is made by the Government of Assam. The financial management is assisted by DDO (Principal) and the Accountant of the college. The departmental expenditure is disbursed by the Principal in consonance with the departmental heads, decided in the meeting with regard to purchasing books, equipment, and other necessary expenditure. IQAC oversees all the developmental works of the college and is the most important cell. Under this IQAC all other cells operate. Academic Committee takes care of the academic activities of the college. Examination Committee takes care of all the internal assessments and ends semester examinations. The Library committee ensures the procurement of books and other materials from time to time. Admission Committee oversees the admissions before the start of the academic session. Cultural Committee organizes all cultural programs throughout the year.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college firmly believes that community service is a noble service towards humanity. Several activities such as cleanliness, plantation and awareness campaigns are conducted for the benefit of society and at the same time, teaching the importance of doing such things to students. Promoting Library consciousness among the students is also one of the Best Practices. The college imparts **Library Orientation Programmes** to encourage Students to explore library, read more books, enhance their level of knowledge. A book fair related to this programme is organized in our College premises every year. Seminar presentation and group discussion are organized under the orientation programme. The programme helps, encourage students to develops their good reading and study habits. It orients them towards research.

Rendering **Extension service in the adopted village** by our College fraternity is the 2nd Best Practice of our college. In 2016 the College adopted a village named Nam Tapesia of Sonapur Revenue Circle in Kamrup (M) district as a part of its Extension Service Programme. Since then the College has been relentlessly working on the overall development of the village by organizing and arranging various camps, interactive sessions, activities and visits. As part of its community service programme, our College had provided electricity connection for Nam Tapesia L.P School. The School has been without electricity since it was established in 1974. NSS unit and the Red Ribbon Club unit of the College have organized special camps in the village and delivered lectures on various socially relevant themes. The teaching faculty of the college has also taken up classes in the Nam Tepesia L.P School for the benefit of the students.

The college has taken a number of green practices in the college and keeps the campus Waste Free Campus, Pollution Free Campus, and Plastic Free Campus. Plantation programs are also undertaken from time to time. Over the last few years, the staff and students have made a significant contribution and transformed this college to a new height and tried to translate the vision, mission, and objectives of this college into a reality.

The college is now operating two streams- Arts and Commerce. The college currently does not have multiple entries and exits in the offered programs. Karmashree Hiteswar Saikia College is ready to adopt NEP 2020 in Multidisciplinary Programmes and Interdisciplinary Courses as soon as our Affiliating University gives us the opportunity.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	The institution preparedness in implementation of Academic Bank of Credits depends upon the guidelines of the Parent University and Higher Education Department of government of Assam. For this purpose, a centralized database along with the database of the college is to be established to digitally store the academic credits earned by the student from various courses so that the credit earned by student previously could be forwarded when the student enters into the program again. For monitoring ABC, proper technical support system will be created.
3. Skill development:	Our College is already offering the skill courses as per CBCS scheme set up by Gauhati University from Semester III to VI in various programs. Our College is ready to adopt and offer various Skill Development Programmes that will be offered in the New Syllabus for NEP 2020 by our Affiliating University or as per the framework done by the Government of India.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	The college ensures appropriate integration of Indian knowledge system by offering MIL (Modern Indian Languages) subjects and core courses as per CBCS scheme set up by Gauhati University. Languages like Assamese, English and Hindi are offered to students as core subjects along with generic electives and skills subjects. Emphasis is given on teaching through Mother Tongue. Other subjects like Political Science, History, Psychology, Philosophy, Education etc. are also offered in order to inculcate sense of national integration, love for art, culture and civic sense among the student community. Teaching these

	courses through online mode during COVID Pandemic was offered smoothly by the college. Infrastructure is available in the college to offer these courses through online mode as and when need arises.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Our college offers two Streams with number of courses. Bachelor Programmes include Bachelors in Arts and Bachelors in Commerce. After completion of their choice of programme, a student is expected to have: • The programmes also empowers the graduates to appear in various competitive examinations or go for higher studies of their choice. • Qualities of observation, precision, analytical mind, logical thinking, clarity of thought and expression, systematic approach, qualitative and quantitative decision making. • Trains the learners to extract information, formulate and solve problems in a systematic and logical manner. • B.Com graduates should be able to obtain basic knowledge and skills for doing business and viable activities of their choice. • B.Com programme also empowers the graduates to appear for various competitive exams or choose a profession of their choice. • Also acquires knowledge in the field of management accounting, corporate accounting, statistical and mathematical techniques and related business laws. The primary focus of the proposed OBE system will be on the following skills such as life skills; basic skills; professional and vocational skills; intellectual skills; and interpersonal and personal skills with the potential benefits to create a clear expectation of what needs to be accomplished by the end of the course; structure their lessons around the student's needs; determine what credits to award the student; feel responsible for their own learning, and learn more through this individual learning. The outcomes analysis will involve the analytical reports rigorously based on student performances and satisfaction feedback and employability index. It is believed that outcome analysis will help to find gaps and carry out continuous improvement to align with the mission of NEP 2020.
6. Distance education/online education:	Our college is providing full support in inculcating distance education by running study centers of Krishna Kanta Handiqui State Open University (KKHSOU), Assam and Institute of Distance and Open Learning (IDOL) of Gauhati university. During

Covid-19 Pandemic, our college switched over to virtual mode of teaching through different applications like Google Meet, Zoom, WhatsApp etc. Once the NEP is implemented in Assam, we will ensure smooth functioning of Distance and Online education as recommended by the policy framers of NEP-2020.

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Every year in the beginning of new academic session starting from June, the next higher level semester students and the newly admitted students are given a broad view of the curriculum to be followed in their respective semesters by the faculty of all the departments. The newly admitted students are given a broad overview of the institution, understand the curriculum and broad perspectives of the subject they will be required to study in the next few semesters.

Some of the students may take up major/honours programme in such subject which may not have been studied by them at the 10+2 level. So introductory lectures are delivered to assess and understand the knowledge level in the concerned subject. Faculties of respective departments facilitates the students in collecting the syllabus of the concerned subject. The students are also provided or assisted in collecting the question papers of the previous examinations. It helps them to get an idea of the question patterns set in the term-end examinations.

Faculty members occasionally provide textbooks and reference books to the students, either from their personal collection or from the departmental libraries, for benefit of the interested learners.

In case of slow learners, teachers try to identify the hindrance factors thereby helping to clear the concepts both in classrooms and also during off periods. Depending upon the requirements, tutorial classes are taken for clarifying doubts and explaining the difficult topics of the curriculum.

Advanced learners are provided standard textbooks and additional reference materials in the form of PDF files in the departmental whattsapp groups and also in the sectional Google Classrooms.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The college pursues the vision of motivating the students to actively participate in the teaching–learning activities. Endeavour is made to make teaching–learning a two way process by setting up ICT–enabled classrooms (Department of Geography, Department of Economics, Department of English), smart classrooms and ICT-enabled meeting halls. These facilities are used for organizing student seminars, lectures, and popular talks for the students. Occasional guest lectures by renowned subject experts from various disciplines and academia are organized from time to time to provide knowledge to the students beyond the prescribed syllabus.

Participative learning process like departmental student seminars, group discussions, project works, home assignments, field works, field surveys and visits to renowned institutions, are employed in the college.

Field visits/ Excursions are carried out in different parts of Assam (Kaziranga, Tezpur, Madan Kamdev, Kulsi river, Surjya Pahar etc.), north-east India and also in other parts of India (Rajasthan). Participation in such activities not only lead to subjective knowledge gain, but also helps the students in learning other life-skills exposure.

The college has taken up many activities and camps under the National Service Scheme (NSS) including yoga camps in our college and also at other platforms. Besides cultural events and competition, departmental wall magazines add to the participative learning of the students.

Some departments also organizes institutional level programmes like World Philosophy Day (Department of Philosophy), National Education Day (Department of Education), World Mental Health Day (Department of Psychology), and Constitution Day (Department of Political Science). The Department of English has enhanced the learning experiences of the students through screening of documentary films. Students also participate in Annual College Week, Inter-College Youth Festival and have earned laurels.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

The ICT–enabled smart room is used by the faculties of the different departments to deliver the contents of the course material. Lectures are delivered using teaching aid amenities like LCD projector for projecting PPT, lecture contents, and interactive smart boards. Necessary software is used in the GIS laboratory (attached with Geography Department) by the students to understand and solve geographical problems.

The teaching-learning process is made effective by the use of e-books, computers and internet connectivity. Workshop on e-resources and ICT based teaching-learning process has been organized by IQAC.

Two awards are given for the best graduate of the college every year. Besides, the Department of Education has initiated an award for the best graduate from the department with a CGPA score of 8 and above. These initiatives not only encourage the students of different departments to perform better in the examinations, but also inculcate a healthy practice amongst different departments to excel in the academic front.

Uma Charan Bania Library and Education Centre awards students with the Best Library User Award every year with the aim of increasing and developing the practice of reading habit by making optimum use of the library resources. The library also organizes Orientation Programme at the beginning of each academic year amongst the newly admitted students to encourage the students to make optimum use of the library resources. Memorandum of Understandings (MoUs) have been signed with different institutions for facilitating student and faculty exchange programs. Every academic department has student whattsapp groups and also Google Classrooms where teachers upload reading material to students. The students also get a platform to discuss important issues amongst themselves, amounting to peer learning.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

The college undertakes internal evaluation in accordance with the guidelines issued by the Gauhati University. Sessional examinations are held once per semester by the respective departments in order to

undertake internal assessment of the students. Continuous evaluation procedure is followed for practical papers.

For smoothly conducting the internal as well as term-end examinations, separate examination committees are appointed by the institution. Teachers, including both permanent as well as full-time faculty members, are nominated in the Examination Committees on rotation basis. Sessional examinations are conducted as stipulated in the academic calendar of the affiliating University. Evaluated answer sheets of sessional examinations are shown to the students so that they learn to rectify their omissions and commissions in the future examinations.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

Response:

The College undertakes to conduct internal evaluation in accordance with the norms and guidelines of Gauhati University, its affiliating university. Examination schedule is prepared by the examination committee and students are communicated through the departmental as well as general notice boards.

Question papers are submitted through HOD of all the respective departments. The said examinations are supervised by the faculty members of the concerned departments. Syllabus for the internal examination is communicated to the students in advance by the concerned teachers teaching the different papers or courses.

In order to maintain transparency and accountability in the evaluation process, evaluated answer sheets are shown to the students. Discrepancies, if any, in the evaluation is brought to the notice of the teachers concerned, and accordingly necessary corrections are made.

Rules and regulations of internal examinations are displayed in the college notice boards along with the Examination Schedule. Full marks and time duration are also printed in the question papers. The attendance record of the students in the examination is documented in a proper format. Marks lists of evaluated answer sheets are documented and thereby submitted to the university through the concerned examination committees. Grievances related to internal examinations are handled and resolved immediately by the respective HODs and teachers of the departments concerned.

Regarding external term-end exams, faculty members of the respective departments and the administrative officials helps them to apply in proper format prescribed by the University, routed through the Principal, for proper re-evaluation and handling of the grievances.

3.3 Extension Activities

3.3.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

Holistic development of the students in the College is very important as youth are the nation builders. The college envisions that education will be complete only if it is integrated with the societal needs and requirements. This will be facilitated only if the college has very strong bond with the neighbouring community, by healthy and productive 'give & take' policy. To achieve this goal various agencies of the college engaged in different types of activities and programmes for the last five years. The various extension activities are carried out by the college in sensitizing students to social issues. Through the extension activities towards community issues, gender disparities, sexual inequity is to be done. Also learner should develop the moral values and commitment to the society. To inculcate the interest about the social issues and to improve the capabilities of the learner, various units and cells viz, NSS, Women Study Centre, Moral and Spiritual Study Circle, Yoga Centre etc. are set up in the institution.

Adopted Village: Our College Adopted a backward Village named-Naam Tapesia, Sonapur, which is 15 Km away from our college. All the peoples in this village are tribal, even they are educationally very backward. The Faculty members of our college sometimes presents some valuable lectures to the Villagers in the L.P School by inviting them along with their children. College have organized various Health Camps, Yoga Camps, distributed more than 100 saplings of fruit trees and organized Cultural Nights in this Village. NSS Unit organized three special camps with more than 50 students, who stayed there for seven days in each camp. The NSS Unit visits the adopted villages two-three days in a month. Our College is going to make a community hall and we provided Electricity to the only L.P school in Nam-Tepesia with the cost of Rs. 50,000. Electricity was not there since independence. There are Seventy Three Tribal houses in this village.

Such activities are helpful to develop the view of our contribution to the society welfare. Various awareness programmes of authorities working in educational, medical, corporate fields are organised. NSS volunteers are actively engaged in extracurricular activities viz. participation in Health Programmes, Blood Donation Camps, Voter Awareness Camp, Summer Camps, Flood Relief Programmes, Swachata Pakhowda, Swachata Abhiyan by conducting Swachchhata rally and Street Plays educating people about cleanliness by slogans, posters and activities. Plantation is done every year, sometimes in collaboration with different NGOs. During the lockdown imposed by the District Administration due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, NSS volunteers and Program Officer along with Principal and Faculty Members of our College conducted an Awareness Programme and distributed essentials goods to the needy.

The College NSS Unit conducts various programmes on World blood donor day, Children's Day, Yoga Day, Gandhi Jayanti Day, NSS Day, digital awareness campaign, Cleanliness drive, organized different lectures, National Integration Day, Swachhata Hi Sewa programme, Rastriya Ekta Divas, Azadi Ka Amrut Mahotsav etc.

"Sankalpa, An NSS mouthpiece" is also published from time to time.

It can be said that organizing extension, collaborative activities would help to develop holistic view among the learners. Through the outreach programmes, learners try to reach to people for their help that develops helping nature and attitude among them.

Open Stage: The college have one Kumud Chandra Deka memorial Open Stage.

Departments: Total 10 Departmental Rooms for Arts and one Teachers Common Room for the Commerce stream.

Office: Well furnished office separate cabins for each Grade III office staff with Computers and internet access.

Principals' Chamber: Spacious Principal chamber well furnished. It is equipped with 2 Computers, 4 CCTV Monitors, Internet facilities, WIFI, TV and an attached kitchen and a furnished toilet.

Vice-Principals' Chamber: The Vice-Principal chamber has space for a sick bed, baby feeding room, First-Aid Box 1 Lap Top, Internet facilities and WIFI.

IQAC Room: The IQAC Room is facilitated with 2 Sets of Computer and Printers along with WIFI-Internet for IQAC Co-ordinator and Assistant Co-ordinator.

Exam Control Room: Conducts the University examinations. It is equipped with Computer, CCTV, WIFI, and Photostate machine.

Exam Zone Room: For Various Examination Zonal works .

STRONG ROOM: One strong room to keep all confidential documents related to university examinations.

Specific Rooms: Specific rooms for the bodies like NSS, Student Union, Yoga Centre, Moral and Spiritual Centre, Cells and Committees, Distance Education Study Centre like IDOL, KKHSOU etc.

Girls Common Room: There is well furnished Girls Common Room in the ground floor with an attached toilet.

Boys Common Room: There is well furnished Boys Common Room for the Boys students with sufficient facilities.

Guest Room: There is a well furnished Guest Room.

Power Supply: Three phase electricity connection with a 250KVA transformer installed. Diesel powered generator of 125 KV is installed in the campus.

Power back up: 4 Nos inverters and one big UPS for computer lab and 22 portable mini UPS.

Water: Deep tube well boring with abundant water, water distribution system with sufficient water outlets installed in the campus.

Parking: Three (Car, Bike and Cycle) spacious parking slot for staff, students and outsiders.

Recreation Area: There is an Open Recreation shed in the campus.

Drinking Water Facility: The college provides RO drinking water facility.

Internet: Uninterrupted internet facility with 30 mbps is made available in the campus.

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

The institution has a well furnished separate building with digital library facilities with collection of more than 14,346 (Fourteen thousand Three Humdred and Forty Six) books, journals and magazines. Old magazine and journals are usually in binding mode and kept separately in back volume section. Reference books are also kept separately from text books section. The old and obsolete books are repaired annually with the help of binding. In addition to circulation service the library provide internet browsing, photocopying service, digital library service etc. Old question papers are kept in digital form as well as hard copies.

The Library is not Automated yet.

The college library comprises with a Books Lending Section, computer Centre, reading rooms and conference hall. The Computer Centre have 4 Computers, Reading room capacity is 60 and conference hall capacity is 50.

Books are classified using DDC system. Accession register is the heart of the library; its entry is based on the suppliers' bill based on single entry maintained on date and year wise.

Reading materials which includes texts, references, rare books, special collection of books on different subjects are the main resources of the library.

Members: Faculties, Students' staff and a few outside members are main users of the library.

- Each person who wants to avail the library facility is treated as a library member.
- The members are bifurcated into staff, students and others.

Generating ID cards

ID card can be generated for students and staff. Generally, for out side readers, library card is not issued. They can utilise our resources but not allowed to borrow books. Through this ID card, members can easily enter inside and borrow books. Student can borrow 2 books at a time for a maximum period of fifteen days.

ORGANIZATIONAL HIERARCHY

Governing Body is the apex advisory body that takes all the policy decisions regarding the College.

The College is governed by this body formed as per the provisions of The Assam Provincialized Colleges and Assam Non- Govt. Colleges Management Rules, 2001 as amended from time to time (the latest being in 2018). The Governing Body is a permanent body even though some of its members are changed at particular intervals like 01/02/03 years. The President of the GB is nominated by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Assam for a period of five years. Two members are nominated by the Vice Chancellor of the affiliating University, namely Gauhati University for a period of 3 years. There are two teacher representatives in the GB nominated from among the teachers and two members from non- teaching staff of the College for a period of 1 year. The Librarian of the College is special invitee to the GB. Besides, the local MLA is also an invited member to the GB. There are three guardian members in the GB. The Principal functions as the Secretary of the Governing Body. The Vice Principal is ex-officio member in the GB.

IQAC is leading all the activities related to formulating quality parameters and monitoring the academic and co-curricular activities to ensure high standards.

At present the following Committees function under the overall supervision of the Principal:

Examination Committee:

The committee conducts Internal and External examination including project and viva and final examination per semester as per the norms of the Gauhati University and maintains all the records pertaining to the examinations.

Magazine Committee:

It publishes an annual magazine "Bakhor" which includes selected articles written by students and special articles written by members of the staff. It also highlights the report on all the annual activities of the institution. Guest writers article are also invited for the Magazine.

Discipline and Anti-Ragging Committee:

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

Being a government provincialized college, Karmashree Hiteswar Saikia College has all the welfare schemes provided by the government for the employees. In addition, the college also has its own welfare measures for its staff.

Pension: All employees in the college are covered under contributory pension scheme (NPS). Incumbents will get the benefit immediately after their retirement.

Insurance Schemes: All employees have to subscribe to insurance schemes namely Group Insurance Scheme. In addition to the facility to avail of loan, incumbents will receive maturity amount that will be paid at the time of retirement.

Medical Allowance: Under this scheme, all the employees get a fixed amount every month.

Academic Leave: All employees are eligible for Academic Leave to attend professional development programmes like seminars, conferences etc..

Earned Leave: All employees are eligible to avail of Earned Leave to attend some urgent needs.

Maternity leaves: Women employees are eligible for maternity leave for a period of six months.

Child Care Leave: All women employees can avail CCL for a period of 2 years.

TA: All employees are eligible to avail of Transport Allowance for official journeys.

College Supported facilities:

Departmental Common Room: Each Department is alloted a seperate common room to execute the Departmental activies with ease and comform.

Free Wi-Fi : All employees have access to high speed internet free of cost.

Special Parking Area: Special parking area is provided to all staff members

Canteens: 2 canteens 'Bohag' and 'Café Citian' provides homely food at reasonable price for the college community.

Ladies Room: Female staff members have special ladies room to provide them secure and private place in the campus. It has necessary facilities.

CCTV- The entire campus is under surveillance camera, and it ensures the safety and security of the college community and their belongings.

6.3.5 Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Our college maintains performance appraisal system as per the provision made by the University Grants Commission for evaluating academic administrative and social responsibilities of teaching and nonteaching staff. Evaluation is made as per PBAS format that are provided by the UGC and Higher Education Department, Government of Assam. Teaching members submit their performance in the PBAS format at the time of their promotion. The entire activities of the teaching are scrutinized by the coordinator of IQAC under the supervision of the Principal and place the same before the screening/ selection committee recommendation by the Gauhati University.

The college authority also observes the activities of the institution and guides for further improvements. The Principal interacts individually with the students whether their performance requires improvement and necessary guidance is given to the concerned department regarding teaching techniques and skills.

Feedback: Regularly collected feed backs from all stakeholders play an important role in evaluating the performance of various academic /non academic segments of the college. Corrective measures are taken to address.

Curricular: There are 276 courses under 13 programmes offered in the college where some of the courses deal with gender issues . They create an awareness on gender issues like, sexual harassment, gender descrimination, etc.

Anti sexual Harassment Committee: A statutory body has been addressing sexual harassment issues in the campus.

STUDENTS' GRIEVANCE REDRESS CELL: A statutory body has been addressing all kinds of students' Grievances and various issues in the campus. This Cell is also maintaining a day to day check on Online and Offline Students Grievance and Complain Facility available in the College Website and Suggestion Box made available to the students.

Co-curricular/ Extracurricular: There are various bodies to organize co-curricular/extracurricular activities in the college. They are NSS, Students Union, Women Study Centre, Moral and Spiritual Study Circle, Red Ribbon Club. Many of them organize gender sensitization programmes. Some of the programmes are: All Women Bhaona, Lecture on Women Empowerment, Camp on Health and Hygiene in the Adopted Village etc. programme organized by Women Study Centre. The Women Study Centre publishes its annual publication named "*The Wick*" every year highlighting women related issues.

Liquid waste from Toilets are attached with scientifically constructed septic tanks. Other Food waste from kitchen and Canteens are deposited in a mud pitches which are covered. All the water waste are connected to the main drain outside the campus which is maintained by Guwahati Municipal Corporation.

Waste Incinerator: Non-degradable, but non recyclable waste is burned in the incinerator installed near the toilet block. This is an ecofriendly incinerator.

Waste recycling system- In addition the college utilizes the possibility to recycle waste in the following ways: 1) All used papers in the college office, Departments etc. are collected, re used if possible and sold to the scrap dealers. 2) Plastic bottles and other plastic waste are collected in the "plastic collection bin" inside the campus.
